It is my distinct pleasure to recommend Dr. David Walton for continuing contract at Lake-Sumter State College.





I have been Dr. Walton's colleague for about 6 years. Dr. Walton is a respected leader with excellent communication skills and a professional educator who is passionate about continuous professional development for himself and his colleagues and who is passionate about engaging students and inspiring them to a philosophy of lifelong learning.

Dr. Walton not only developed "Introduction to Anthropology for Lake-Sumter State College and received institutional "Quality Matters" certification, he also developed "Introduction to World Archeology." His experience with research in Mexico (funded by grants from Lake-Sumter State College, Boston University, Dartmouth College and the National Science Foundation) brings prestige to the college but also generates a lot of student interest so enrollment is always strong in his classes. He is a student club leader and he has arranged many field trips for students. His dedication to student learning is evident in all he does. An example is during the pandemic, he not only converted a heavy course load to online real time using Zoom for class meetings and office hours, he did so in a manner that mirrored face-to-face time with regards to the courses being student-learning focused.

I highly recommend Dr. David Walton who is an Assistant Professor of Anthropology at Lake Sumter State College. David has been with the college for six years. He joined the college after a nationwide search to find an Instructor of Anthropology because the subject was added to the state core in general education. I, Dr. Michael Morse, was the chair of that committee and he was the most qualified candidate of the over thirty candidates we screened for that position.

David is self-motivated and extremely intelligent as well as being a multitasker. He had already been approved for his doctoral project (ABD) when David joined the college in Fall 2015. While continuing to work on the research of and the writing of his dissertation, he developed and began teaching ANT 2000 Introduction to Anthropology, a writing intensive course that earned institutional Quality Matters certification in the 2019/2020 academic school year. David developed a new course for the college, ANT 2100 Introduction to World Archaeology, based on his expertise as an archaeologist. He also consistently offers sections of SLS 1501 Foundations of Success Seminar and GEO 1000 Introduction to Geography to give students more educational options.

Besides being a great professor, David is also an excellent scholar and published before he began working at LSSC. He has written articles published in leading peer-reviewed academic journals in his field such as Journal of Archaeological Method and Theory, Antiquity, Ancient Mesoamerica, and Journal of Field Archaeology and presented at national conferences of the Society for American Archaeology. To help reach the popular audience, David also co-hosted a television special, Lost Pyramids of the Aztecs (2020), which aired on the Science Channel in the US, Channel 4 in the UK, and France 5.

David is very devoted to the students of LSSC. David developed a faculty project centered on enhancing student learning. His topic was the incorporation of hands-on, kinesthetic learning opportunities for his students. He includes activities such as obsidian tool production and the handling of skull casts as instructional aides based on the results of this project. His continuing contract portfolio was submitted in December 2019 and approved by each level of

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administration, including the District Board of Trustees in Spring 2020. In Fall 2020, the college began using his portfolio as one of its exemplars for annual contract faculty members to consult.

Continuing with the subject of a student-centered approach, David also, without pay, became one of the advisors to one of our student groups. As an adviser for the student group The Humanities Preservation Society, he organizes and chaperones trips to museums and cultural festivals with student members. David also worked as a faculty mentor to one of the inaugural Honors Program students in their capstone project.

Dr. Walton also served the college in many ways. He was tapped as a co-chair to develop an Institutional Review Board, working through this committee to get procedures approved by the Deans Council and Strategic Planning council. He always attends meetings and faithfully discharges his obligations beyond the norm.

As stated at the beginning of this recommendation, I would completely and without reservation recommend him for any and all positions for which he applies.
